

BritCham Statement on the announcement of the COMPASS Framework

Friday, March 3, 2022: The British Chamber of Commerce Singapore acknowledges the Ministry of Manpower's new Complementarity Assessment (COMPASS) framework and the efforts to balance Singapore's future aspirations as a thriving economy with the needs of all employers. We welcome the transparency of the model set to help businesses understand the requirements for applying for future work passes for top foreign talent.

The staggered increase in qualifying salaries and foreign worker levies beginning later this year, and for renewals 12 months later, will undoubtedly impact businesses financially at a time when post-Covid economic recovery is still in the preliminary stages. The justification for balancing salary levels with the top tier of the local skilled workforce marks a clear intention for Singapore to attract the highest quality of foreign talent available in the global market. We believe this may help with the predictability of future updates with EP and S Pass applications going forward.

With a period of adjustment time factored into the Government rollout of COMPASS, businesses will be able to benchmark their status within their sector. Using the new Pre-Assessment Tool, employers can visualise where they need to take appropriate actions to adjust salaries against market rate, review their business models or hiring practices.

Within Singapore, SMEs account for 70% of employment¹ and make a significant impact economically, culturally and in the transference of skills to the local market. We welcome the recognition of the needs of businesses with less than 25 PMET employees (proxied by employees earning at least \$3,000 per month). In the COMPASS framework, 10 points are given to these business types in the critical categories of Diversity (the share of a candidate's nationality among a firm's PMETs) and Support for Local Employment (the firm's share of local PMETs within its subsector).

The British Chamber will work with our members to gather feedback and support any requests for further clarification through our ongoing relationship with the Ministry of Manpower. On the 28th of April, we will be hosting Minister for Manpower Dr Tan See Leng ahead of our AGM in a special members-only event to facilitate a two-way dialogue between the Ministry and industry. This event forms part of our continued Future of Work series, supporting businesses with skills and workforce development.

Executive Director at the British Chamber of Commerce Singapore, David Kelly, said:

"As Minister Lawrence Wong recently highlighted in his Budget speech, Singapore remains pro-business and keen to attract top talent from around the world. As one of the leading Chambers of Commerce in Singapore, we will always support our members in their commitment to grow, making the city-state their
